



Lucy D. Ozarin, M.D.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Lucy D. Ozarin, M.D., M.P.H., received her medical degree from the New York Medical College and a degree in public health from Harvard University. Her entire career has been devoted to clinical and administrative work in the public sector including the U.S. Navy during World War II, Veterans Administration Central Office, the National Institute of Mental Health, and the World Health Organization Regional Office for Europe in Copenhagen. Dr. Ozarin was on the psychiatric faculty at Georgetown University, which awarded her a Vincennes medal in 1983. A member and Distinguished Fellow of APA for 61 years, she was Book Review Editor of the *APA Journal*, now *Psychiatric Services*, for 20 years. Since 1989, APA's *Psychiatric News* has published more than 60 of her history notes. Dr. Ozarin's bibliography contains more than 80 other publications. She has been a volunteer in the APA library for nearly 20 years and is currently working on an album of photographs and biographies of APA presidents. She has served continuously on APA committees, beginning with the Standards Committee in the mid-1950s and including Chair of the Program Committee of the Institute on Psychiatric Services in 1958.

The *Distinguished Service Award* was established by the APA Board of Trustees in 1964 to honor APA members and nonmembers who have contributed exceptional meritorious service to American psychiatry.

This award is selected by the APA Board of Trustees based on the recommendation of the Distinguished Service Awards Corresponding Committee, established in 1989.
